Mike Gordon arrived with his family in Seward in 1953, at age ten. Mike graduated from Anchorage High School in 1960 and in 1970 opened what was to become the world famous Chilkoot Charlie's nightclub, which he owned and operated for forty-five years, selling the operation to his employees in 2015.

Mike has completed fifteen marathons and summited the highest mountain on six of the seven continents, reaching 27,500 feet on Mt Everest, the seventh, on his third attempt at age fifty. He graduated from the University of San Francisco with a bachelor's degree in politics and a minor in philosophy, later earning a master's degree in writing from Alaska Pacific University.
